CURRICULUM FEATURES

The Carlisle Area School District offers a wide variety of courses to meet the needs of students interested in the college preparatory, business, vocational-technical, and Tech Prep fields.

The high school curriculum provides a strong background in each of the traditional academic areas. Language Arts is taught as an integrated subject with emphasis upon understanding literature, critical thinking and the development of sound writing skills. The areas of science and mathematics offer students a variety of courses that will be useful for practical applications as well as the pursuit of higher education. The social studies program prepares students to function as knowledgeable and productive members of society.

This core curriculum is designed to provide students with the necessary skills to be successful adults. Elective courses in the areas of computer technology, technology, family/ consumer science, art and music, as well as world languages make the total program appealing.

Carlisle High School also offers courses in a virtual learning format. These courses have been designed to augment our school's traditional curricular offerings and serve the needs of both traditional and non-traditional students.

Students with outstanding abilities are encouraged to challenge themselves in their areas of excellence. Students may register for Advanced Placement courses, honors courses, or accelerated studies. Additionally, some students may be permitted to enroll in courses at Dickinson College and other local colleges. Honors and AP courses are available in English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, World Languages, and Art.

An accelerated track is available in English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and World Languages. The school district also offers a wide range of special education services to eligible students.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

In order to graduate from Carlisle High School, members of the Class of 2017 had to pass a minimum of 22 core curriculum credits in addition to Health I, Safety Education, Health II and Physical Education in grades nine through twelve. Minimum graduation requirements are as follows:

GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Credit values are assigned to each course. Courses meeting four or more times per week in fifty minute periods earn one credit each, other courses proportionately less. To determine quality points, grade values are multiplied by credit values. Total quality points are divided by credits attempted to determine the grade point average. A weighted grade point average is determined by adding .5 to the quality point total for each honors and Advanced Placement course. Grades earned at a college are not included in the grade point average.

CLASS RANKS

Cumulative class ranks are calculated for all students who attend Carlisle High School for more than one year. Both weighted and non-weighted ranks are calculated for college admissions purposes.
